CAREER IDENTITY

STEP 1: Thinking about the future...

- Access online career exploration tools and collect information.
- Undertake personal reflection activities to identify your strengths and interest areas.
- Discuss career development ideas with trusted adults (family, school staff and career counsellors).
- Start building and banking a set of skills through school, home and work environments.



STEP 2: Explore the options...

Undertake a deeper exploration of potential careers, education and training requirements, and consider senior secondary subjects which may support potential post-school pathways.

- Visit tertiary (university) open days and career expos to ask questions and collect information.
- Investigate subject offerings, elective subjects and potential study pathways in Year 10, 11 & 12.
